I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. ¹⁹For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. ²⁰Now if I do what I do not want, it is no longer I that do it, but sin that dwells within me.

²¹So I find it to be a law that when I want to do what is good, evil lies close at hand. ²²For I delight in the law of God in my inmost self, ²³but I see in my members another law at war with the law of my mind, making me captive to the law of sin that dwells in my members. ²⁴Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of death? ^{25a}Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord! Word of God. Word of Life. Thanks be to God.

²⁵At that time Jesus said, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; ²⁶yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. ²⁷All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one

knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.

²⁸“Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. ²⁹Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.” The gospel of the Lord. our buildings. Shine in this place that we might notice the ways your love transforms our lives. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We pray for the relationships we share through you, O God. Help us to speak the truth in love to one another. Lead us so we may be strengthened in our common work. Give us courage to go where you call and do what you ask, even when it means we risk our own safety. Bind us together to one another as you draw us closer to your own heart. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We give thanks for those who have died in faith, whom we name before you. (Silence) Especially we remember our black and brown siblings who have been killed because of the color of their skin. Welcome them into your eternal rest and comfort us in our grief until we are joined with them in new life. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

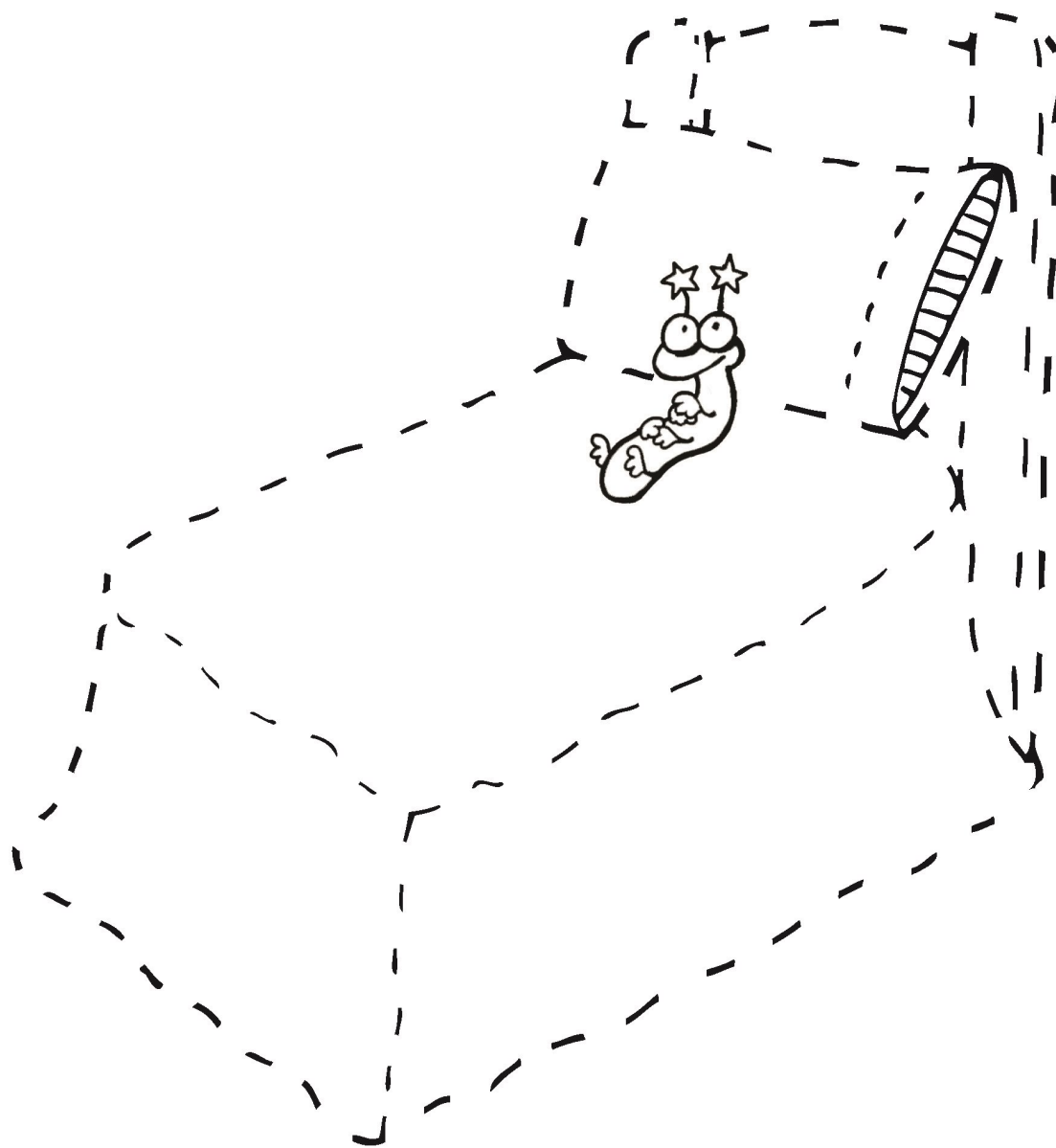

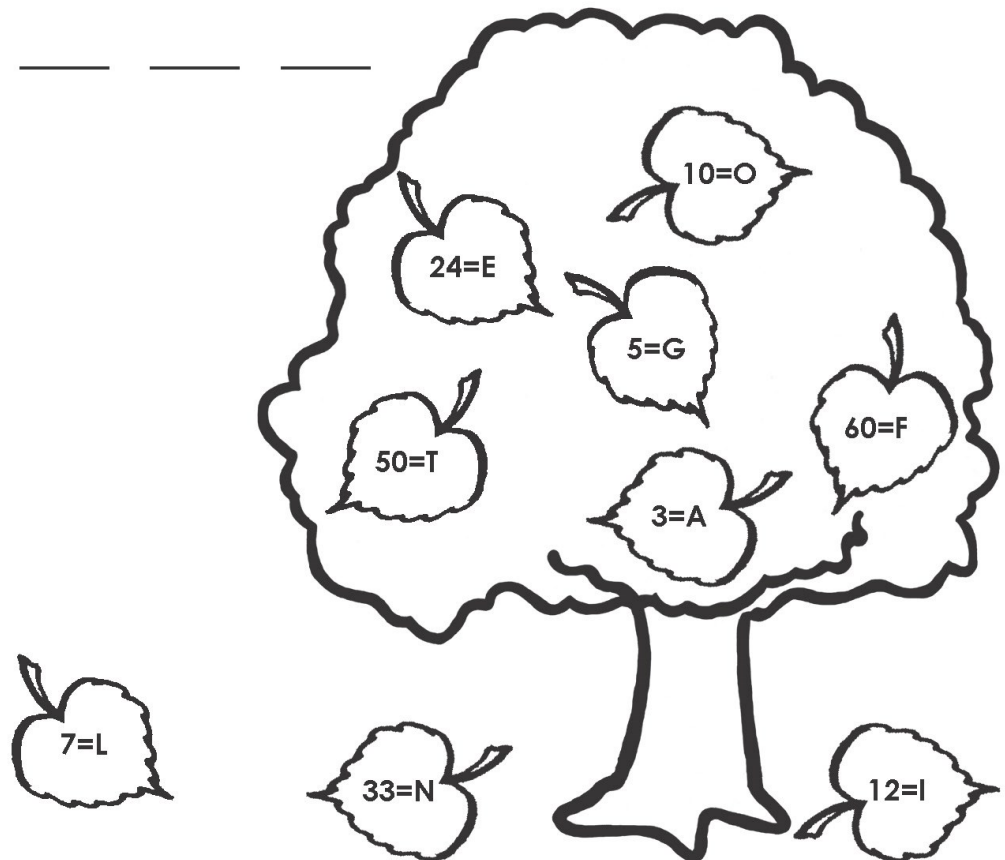

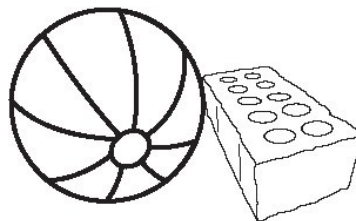
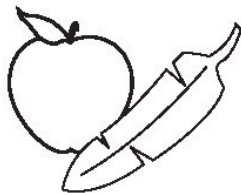
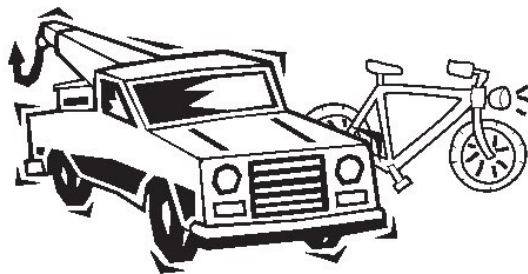
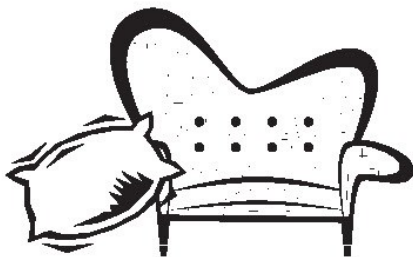
Matthew 11:28
