## From Pastor Gladys

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Early on in my days as a Lutheran Christian, I participated in 54-week bible study and evangelism course called, "Word and Witness". To say that this class changed my life would be an understatement. You see, it was what I learned in this course and the passion it kindled within me for understanding the Bible that eventually led me to seminary. The rest, as they say, is history.

One of the books we read during Word and Witness was, "The Miracle of Dialogue" by Reuel Howe. I still remember it 32 years later because in it Howe touched on something that is as critical today as it has ever been --- the importance of people listening to and speaking with one another with empathy and honesty in order to build meaning between them. Dialogue isn't about agreement or answers. Its aim is not conformity or unanimity of opinion, but rather about relationships built on understanding and compassion.

Dialogue is a wonderful Greek word (*diá*, "through") + *logos*, "word") that, at the heart, captures what God does in relating to us human being. In Jesus, "the Word became flesh and lived among us... full of grace and truth." (John 1:14) God expects that we too, as followers of Jesus Christ and members of his living body, the Church, will also be in dialogue, both with God and with one another. Indeed, such dialogue is an important means of bringing healing and hope to the world.

At our recent New Jersey Synod Assembly two resolutions were adopted. One had to do with *working toward a system of clergy compensation that is fair, just, and provides financial sustainability for all clergy*. The other was about the importance of conversing with those whose political affiliation and thoughts are different from our own. That resolution "*encouraged members of our congregations to enter into difficult conversations with those with whom they disagree.*"

While such *conversations* are important, *dialogue* is different from conversation. Dialogue enables all who enter into it to feel a connection with others; it heightens the sense that meaning is flowing between them. In dialogue says Howe, "We listen for the questions behind the question, for the fear behind the bravado, for the insecurity behind the pretense, and for the courage behind the timidity..."

For the past three years, members of our Summit Interfaith Council congregations have participated in Dialogue Circles on Race. More than 300 people have participated so far, but only 2 members of

St. John's have taken advantage of this opportunity. Our current political climate has surely exposed the real chasms that exist in our country economically, geographically and politically. However, one of the constant and pervasive rifts among us has been our lack of understanding the damaging effects of racism on *all of us*, and our unwillingness to do whatever we can to dismantle it.

## From Pastor Blake

2017 marks the quincentenary of the Reformation. 500 years since the schism of the western church, the birth of Protestantism, and this movement we call Lutheranism. It is a significant historical occasion.

The significance of the anniversary should not be overlooked. Yes, for us Lutherans this is time for a certain amount of celebration. The theological proposals of one German priest-professor at a backwater university, has in these five centuries since led to 72+ million adherents that span the globe.

This is also a moment to look back and reflect on our church's shortcomings. We should be ready to note our mistakes, repent of our sins, and learn from our failures. It has not been five hundred years of triumph-to-triumph advancing. Our church has participated in pogroms and witch hunts. We helped enslave one race and colonize, and nearly eradicate, another. We have often been willing to trade the legacy of God's liberating grace for a sense of cultural superiority.

History is important. History, at its best, should show us the good, the bad, and the ugly of our past. What is more, history helps us explain our present and it has a profound effect in charting our future.

In this anniversary year, I encourage you to learn more about our church's history. Read a book, watch a film, or come to a class. There will be a variety of opportunities for individual and group learning over the next months at St. John's to learn more about the Reformation and our history since—take part. It is an amazing story full of interest, intrigue, and inspiration. Too often we have forgotten our history or have accepted too simplistic a tale. Take the time to learn the deeper, fuller story of Luther and global Lutheranism. Ours is a complicated but also rich history.

I pray for God's continued mercy and guidance upon our church as we claim God's liberating grace for the next 500 years!

### Music Notes:

**A Heart-felt Thank you:** As another program year comes to a close, I rejoice at and am humbled by the faithful service of St. John's choirs, ensembles, cantors, vocalists, and instrumentalists again this year. "We are blessed to be a blessing" is a theme that guides us, and the gifts of time and talent given by so many to praise God and to lead, proclaim, and inspire us in worship is what makes St. John's music ministry so extraordinary. Did you know that members of the Adult Choir give a minimum of 2 hours most weeks from September through early June to rehearse together? The Lutherringers give an hour most weeks, and the Recorder Ensemble almost that. Some of our musicians serve in all three groups! Individual musicians likewise devote time to learning and practicing to make our collaborative rehearsals work. This would not be possible without generous hearts, spirits, and talents. And so, I give thanks to God for each and every musician who has served this past year in the music ministry. And I pray that God will continue to bless our work together and open up new opportunities for service in the future.

**Summer Music:** Vocalists and instrumentalists are invited to grace our summer worship with offering and/or Communion music. Feel free to suggest selections from your repertoire, or ask me and I'll find something for you. A sign-up sheet is posted in the rear entryway.

**Summer Cantors:** If you would like to lead the singing of the "Bread of Life" Kyrie and the Psalm during a 10:30 AM worship service from June 18<sup>th</sup> to September 10<sup>th</sup>, check the sign-up sheet in the rear entryway for available dates.

**Summer Liturgy Musicians:** Intermediate and advanced-level instrumentalists (e.g., guitar, flute, trumpet, strings, clarinet, etc.) are welcome in the 10:30 AM Liturgy ensemble. See me at church or send me an email for parts.

### Summer Luther Chorales

Our celebration of the upcoming 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of

the Reformation continues with new chorales this summer. In June, we will lift up Martin Luther's Pentecost hymn, ELW 395, "Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord"; in July, ELW 499, "O Lord, We Praise You," and in August ELW 743, "Now to the Holy Spirit Let Us Pray."

"Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord" begins with an anonymous translation of the 11<sup>th</sup> C. Latin antiphon "Veni Sancte Spiritus." In the early church, an antiphon was a song sung alternately by two groups of singers. In 1524, Luther wrote new words to create verses 2 & 3, keeping the meter, tune, and structure of the older hymn intact. Verse 2 is a prayer for the Holy Spirit to teach us to know God the Father and to protect us from error. Verse 3 recalls the miracles of Pentecost and their effect on the apostles, followed by a prayer that the Spirit give strength to make us courageous servants during our lifetimes. In 1567, the hymn was translated into Swedish, and in 1855 into English.

"O Lord, We Praise You" and "Now to the Holy Spirit" were revised and enlarged from popular pre-Reformation hymns. Verse 1 of "O Lord, We Praise You" is from the 15<sup>th</sup> C. Luther added verses 2 & 3 to make it a post-Communion hymn of thanksgiving and prayer. Its tune is based on an old German folk tune. The first verse of "Now to the Holy Spirit" dates from the 13<sup>th</sup> C. In 1524, Luther added verses 2-4 as a prayer to the Holy Spirit—the "Precious Light, "Sacred Love, and "Highest Comfort"—to give us courage in the trials of life. In Luther's German Mass, this hymn was sung between the Epistle and the Gospel. More recently, it has been sung for Pentecost, communion, ordinations, gathering hymns, and the hymn of the day. Its tune is based on a medieval chant.

We at St. John's, however reluctant we might be, must enter into this struggle with dialogical hearts and heads because this is who we are as the people of God. We must trust, sisters and brothers, as I have said many times, that the only "ism" that can conquer all the other isms in our lives --- racism, sexism, classism, ageism, etc. is BAPTISM. This is what brings us into God's family and keeps us bound together in love so that in the name of Christ we can strive for justice and peace in this world.

In July, St. John's Youth Missions will be traveling to Rocky Gap in Bland County, Virginia for Appalachia Service Project. Rocky Gap is an unincorporated community in southwestern Virginia, near the West Virginia border. It sits at a high elevation of about 2,887 feet. Major employers in the area include construction, manufacturing, transportation and warehousing, and the Bland County Schools. We will be staying at Mount Laurel Camp, a former Methodist camp that closed a few years ago. ASP has rented the space in the summer for the past three years.
