From Pastor Gladys

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

A number of years ago I had the privilege of serving on the board of what was then called the “Division for Church in Society” unit of the ELCA. As both lay and ordained theologians, we wrestled with how to assist this church in continuing to be a Christian community that lives its faith publicly.

We talked about what it means that the ELCA is a community of “moral deliberation”. We read responses to the drafts of various social statements that had been developed to address important societal issues. We struggled over how to help our congregations receive and implement the statements that had been adopted. And we did our very best to help the members of the ELCA live out their baptismal vocations faithfully and responsibly in the world.

While we have always been a public church, the need for us Lutheran Christians to exercise our faith in society has taken on a new sense of urgency in these divisive times in our country. The primary way that we live as members of the body of Christ is to be just that—the baptized children of God whose faith is active in the world—in our marriages, families, work places, schools, community organizations and political parties.

At the same time, the people of God must be free to stand in opposition to society and to address those actions and activities in the world that stand against the will of God. We do so ever-mindful that we are simultaneously saints and sinners. Yet when appropriate, like the Old Testament prophets, we must challenge our culture.

The ELCA’s first Social Statement, “The Church in Society: A Lutheran Perspective” says it well:

“As a prophetic presence, this church has the obligation to name and denounce the idols before which people bow, to identify the power of sin present in social structures, and to advocate in hope with poor and powerless people. When religious or secular structures, ideologies, or authorities claim to be absolute, this church says, “We must obey God rather than any human authority” (Acts 5:29).³ With Martin Luther, this church understands that “to rebuke” those in authority “through God’s Word spoken publicly, boldly and honestly” is “not seditious” but “a praiseworthy, noble, and ... particularly great service to God.”⁴

How we live our faith within the church and beyond is certainly a matter of personal choice. That we live our faith is not optional. It is what we are called to do. I pray that during these times when there is so much anxiety and stress in our public life, that not only will St. John’s be a haven for hurt souls, but also a hound, urging us to ever stronger commitments to the saving and life-transforming gospel of Jesus Christ. One of my seminary professors said that the gospel both comforts the afflicted and afflicts the comfortable. I think this is such a time. Please continue praying for St. John’s and our life together so

From Pastor Blake

500 years ago, a German monk and professor of theology at a backwater university began a revolution. His message was radical in that he proclaimed that ordinary people could approach God on their own, were saved by grace through faith apart from their own merit, and that God’s Word should be in the hands and hearts of the common people. What was even more radical was his platform of dissemination—how he got the word out—the printed word. Even in his changing, Renaissance world, using the new means of communicating was a shocking development. That monk was Martin Luther and his message was a return to the essentials of Christ as found in scripture, but his mode of communication was completely new and cutting-edge.

In 2017, we too are in an age of reformation, upheaval, and change. We have been hearing the call of the Holy Spirit to renew our commitment to Christ’s call to inclusion and Christ’s commission to us to share the message of the gospel with the world around us. In truth, this is not a new message at all, but like Luther a rediscovery of God’s heart to welcome all people and have hearts aflame with God’s desire for justice and mercy.

Also like Luther, we are in age of changing communication. For Luther, it was the advent of the print age. For us, we are in the birthing of the digital age. We are connected and communicate in new ways—changing ways. Our relationships are now bolstered not only with physical interaction but also in real-time, virtual interaction. This is exciting, scary, and troubling for some. For example, I presided over a funeral here at St. John’s where one of the grieving children with a debilitating medical condition was Skyped into the service. One of the oldest members was able to remain connected to the church by watching sermons uploaded to YouTube. Moreover, while it hasn’t happened here yet, I have heard of churches where baptismal sponsors in foreign countries participated in the service via Facetime.

We need to be open to change so that we can continue sharing the old, old story of Jesus and continue the ancient work of making disciples of all nations. It is for the sake of the gospel that we have to be early adopters of technology in the church, not reticent and reluctant tag-alongs. We need to be open and ready to use any and every form of communication to connect people with Christ. Below, I offer a poem by Meredith Gould, which is a variation of a poem by St. Teresa of Avila that helps us pray through our need to express our faith regularly and boldly in each new form of technology for the sake of Christ.

Christ has no online presence but yours,
No blog, no Facebook page but yours,
Yours are the tweets through which love touches this world,
Yours are the posts through which the Gospel is shared,
Christ has no online presence but yours,
No blog, no Facebook page but yours.

From the Director of Music/Organist

Seasonal Luther Chorales

Lent and Easter will bring us two new chorales in honor of the 500th anniversary of Luther's Reformation: "Out of the Depths I Cry to You" (ELW 600) and "Christ Is Arisen" (ELW 372).

1524 was a productive hymn-writing year for Martin Luther. He wrote 21 hymns, including the metrical paraphrase of Psalm 130, "Out of the Depths I Cry to You." Psalm 130 was one of Luther's favorite psalms and this paraphrase was even sung at his funeral. He is thought to have composed the tune *Aus tiefer Not* as well. It is in bar form, not the drinking kind, but AAB, which is how music sung by the minnesingers (poet-musicians) of the 12th-14th centuries was organized. "AAB" means there is an A, or first, section that is repeated (AA), followed by a B, or second, section that is different and often longer. Another distinctive feature of *Aus tiefer Not* is that it's based on the Phrygian mode, one of the seven ancient church modes or scales, where the first and second notes of the scale are a half step apart. The peculiar sound of this interval emphasizes the "depths of despair" in the psalm.

"Christ Is Arisen" is another of Luther's favorite hymns. Luther said, "After a time one tires of singing all other hymns, but the "Christ ist erstanden" one can always sing again." (*The Handbook to the Lutheran Hymnal* by W. G. Polack) "Christ Is Arisen" is one of the oldest German hymns and the oldest German Easter hymn. No one knows who wrote the text, but it dates to around 1,100 and is based on an even older hymn, "Christians, to the Paschal Victim" (ELW 371). Instead of ending with the Kyrie, though, verse 3 of "Christ Is Arisen" erupts in a series of three "Alleluias." Originally set in the Dorian mode, another of the seven church modes, the tune's strong rhythm propels the text and energetic singing.

Worshippers at 8 AM will return to singing the traditional Setting 10 during Lent, and for Easter/Eastertide we will be introducing Setting 4. Rumor has it that a very popular setting will be coming back this summer at 10:30 AM . . .

ASP News

St. John's Appalachia Service Project (ASP) teams are less than 5 months away from their annual mission trip to Central Appalachia. Currently, we have 19 youth and adults preparing to go to Bland County, Virginia which is about 515 miles, or 8.5 hours, away from Summit.

We had our first meeting in February to watch a documentary about Appalachia: *Burning the Future: Coal in America*. The movie followed some residents of West Virginia, who out of desperation for the safety of their homes and their health, have become activists because of what mountaintop removal is doing to the environment. Blasting the tops off mountains to expose seams of coal, covering streams with blast waste, and building slurry ponds to contain the toxins used to extract every last ounce of coal, not only destroys the natural beauty of the area, but it ultimately leads to flooding and poisons drinking water. The activists ask the question, "Do you know where your electricity comes from?" This gave our ASP volunteers something to think about as well as examine the short and long term environmental and human cost involved.

This year's ASP theme is *Love in Action*, and it is based upon 1 John 3:18:

"Dear children, let us not love with words or tongue, but with actions and truth."

Special Short-Term Opportunity: Knitting infant hats for personal delivery to a Lutheran hospital in Namibia St. John’s member Linda Walker will be traveling to Namibia in May, along with other lay leaders from the ELCA, to attend part of the Lutheran World Federation Meeting in Windhoek, after which the ELCA group will travel north to visit churches of the Evangelical Lutheran Church In the Republic of Namibia (ELCRN), with whom the NJ Synod has been a companion Synod for over 20 years

One of the stops will be at an ELCRN hospital, one of only 2 hospitals serving about 1 million people in the north. The visit will occur at the beginning of Namibia’s winter season, and the ELCA delegation is planning to bring a gift of hand-knit baby hats for the newborn and infant patients there.
